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Title: Advocacy in School Psychology: It's the Culturally Responsible Thing to Do

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Description:

Advocacy has been discussed in school psychology for some time. Indeed, advocacy has been identified as a foundational competency in the field and in the future role of the field (Malone, 2024; Song et al., 2019). Despite its importance in the field, it is disheartening to learn that there is very little empirical research on advocacy. Moreover, there is an inadequate treatment of advocacy in the literature given its complexity, i.e., varying levels of implementation, types, and styles. This webinar will provide a survey of the research on advocacy in school psychology from a social justice and cultural responsible framework. In doing so, participants will understand what advocacy is, its complexity, considerations for being an advocate, and future research areas.
